Hospice House Update

As many of you know, it has been a vision of Friends of Lewis County Hospice to build a Hospice Home in Lewis County. This past year we shared a survey to see what the public thought regarding this project - the results were overwhelmingly positive. A small committee has been meeting this past summer and has made tremendous progress. They have met with architects from Bernier & Carr to share our vision and to find out exactly what this would entail. FOLCH has now retained their services to draw up plans and construct a model. The committee is in the process of reviewing three possible locations, making a site visit to one. We would also entertain donated land, 3 – 5 acres, keeping in mind the need for public water and sewer.

The cost of the project will be enormous. Friends of Lewis County Hospice have been working and saving for many years and are prepared to contribute a large portion of the cost, but much more will be needed. The committee will be meeting with a grant writer and are hoping to begin a Capital Project soon.

Although it all seems overwhelming, we are very excited to begin this new project. We will continue to keep you updated and look for your continued support.

My return to school happened in 2012...

15 years after my high school
graduation. I decided after having my
7th child delivered here at LCHS that I
would go to college to better my future
and the future of my children. In the
great words of Dr. Crawford....."an
educated woman is a respected
woman". I chose the field of nursing
after sitting in the living room of my ex
husband's grandfather and watching
his Hospice nurse. At that very moment
I knew what I wanted to be when I grew
up...I started the process of getting my
classes done to get my dream job.



I graduated from St. Elizabeth's College of Nursing in 2016, my first nursing job was at St. E's on the ortho unit... a bittersweet job. I learned a lot. I then decided family first and moved onto South Lewis Central School where I was an elementary nurse for 3 years. In 2019 I missed caring for patients so much I decided LCHS would be a great place to work weekends, soon after in June of 2020 I moved into a full time position as Intake Supervisor for Home Health and Hospice, I was very eager to take a try at Hospice and was allowed the opportunity. I found my passion... End of Life Care for our community. I tell everyone this is the best job I have ever had... the reward is taking time to get to know people and give the absolute best care at the end of their life. I have now decided to lead my great team to better serve our county residents as Home Health and Hospice Director of Patient Services. I continue to provide education to our facility on end of life care and have a team that supports me and my goal to give our patients the best care. In my spare time I love spending time with my family.

How to Approach Hospice Conversations with Loved Ones

Have you had someone in your life that you know could use hospice support but are unsure on how to start the conversation? **Here are some tips!**

First, I think it's important to validate that these conversations can be hard but by giving someone the space and a listening ear is a great start. If someone has been given a terminal diagnosis it's important for them to explore all of their available options. Even if someone is still receiving life sustaining treatment, encouraging them to hear what hospice can offer may help them make further decisions and lessen the fear.

When one chooses to stop treatment or they are no longer a candidate, hospice may be mentioned to them by their medical team. Some things that I like to highlight is that choosing hospice does not mean giving up. Ultimately the patient's body is in control and the hospice team is there to support with symptom management, emotional support, end of life planning and education. You can explain to them that most routine medications can be continued and their primary care doctors are typically still involved in guiding our team, since they likely know the patient best! Instead of going back and forth to different medical appointments they now have an experienced team coming to their home who reports back to their primary care. That time can then be spent getting out of their home doing enjoyable things like going to their family camp, watching sporting events or a drive to their favorite diner for coffee. Hospice does not mean you are home bound and we encourage you to be as functional as your body allows. Unfortunately, we admit people to hospice after they have spent many days in a hospital or had repeat ER visits. With hospice care we are not in the home 24/7 but there is a RN on call 24/7. So on a weekend they no longer have to worry about who to call if they start experiencing symptoms or having to make another ER visit.

Although I could go on about how hospice can benefit someone, one last thing I want to point out is that the patient and family are the ones driving their care. Our staff is there to educate and support but ultimately the choice is up to the patient or decision makers on how they want their care to look. As long as they are safe, our team enables patients to live out their lives as they wish. We do not force medication on patients, we let them make their decision while educating on some of the benefits.

While there are many ways we can assist someone with their physical symptoms, we are there for the emotional needs as well. Licensed Social Workers, Chaplains and Volunteers can be helpful with providing grief support, spiritual needs and companionship too. We are not just there for the patient but the family and caregivers as well.

Hospice can help people focus on living and what is important to them despite having a terminal diagnosis. The best thing we can do is educate each other, knowledge reduces fear.
