President Report

I would like to report once a year on what we have been busy doing this past year. If you haven't already noticed, we have developed a Facebook page (Friends of Lewis Hospice, Inc). Please visit and like our page and check for new postings. We also have a web page (friendsoflchospice.org) which will give you information about FOLCH and how to donate. We are a fundraising organization that raises funds for the Lewis County Hospice. All our funds go directly to the Lewis County Hospice program. We are very proud that we can contribute to the program in a very substantial way every year.

We donated \$150,000 at this year's Epicurean to defray costs for the Lewis County Hospice program and decided to give them another \$50,000 this year. Our Epicurean and Light Up a Life fundraisers are the reason we can so generously donate to this hospice service. Most importantly, we have a very generous and understanding community who is also willing to donate to such a worthy cause.

There have been some recent conversations about having a Lewis County Hospice home in our community. We feel the need as we are sending hospice patients to Jefferson County when their family cannot take care of them. Jefferson County is very receptive, but their own community comes first, so we are not always successful in getting our hospice patients into their home. We are trying to do a few surveys for community input. A question will be on the new JCC survey, and we plan to put it on our Facebook page, webpage, in the newsletter and at the Light Up a Life locations. This will be a very simple survey that requires a yes or no answer. We hope you all will take part in one of our survey opportunities and let us know how you feel.

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The Value of Volunteering for Hospice

The spirit of hospice volunteering stems from a desire to give comfort, peace and care to those facing a terminal illness, their caregivers and loved ones. In those precious end-of-life moments, hospice volunteers offer a level of companionship and support to patients and their families.

In fact, Medicare has identified the importance and value of volunteers in patients and families lives so much that it requires that volunteer hours equal at least 5% of the hospice providers total patient care hours.

People become hospice volunteers for many reasons. Many volunteer to express gratitude for help they received during their loved one's illness. The benefit of engaging in this type of community service is that you're making a difference where you live. You're giving back, and you're helping others.

What kinds of things do hospice volunteers do? Volunteers perform many important duties. Whether providing companionship in a patient's home, providing an opportunity for families to be able to run errands, attend appointments, assist with special events, support the bereavement program or perform administrative tasks in the hospice office. Volunteers play a vital role in enabling hospice to meet the needs of the patients and families.

How can I become a hospice volunteer? Volunteers at Lewis County Hospice will need to complete an application and background check. The Volunteer coordinator will meet with each volunteer to learn more about what areas of Hospice you are interested in helping. We operate under the Lewis County Health System, so there are requirements regarding your physical health, immunizations and training. We will provide you with training about Hospice and the specific type of volunteering you wish to do.

In most cases we require a one year post bereavement waiting period. This guideline helps to ensure that hospice volunteers have healed from their own loss enough to be able to lend emotional support to patients and families.

What is a Hospice House?

The Friends of Lewis County Hospice Board is conducting a brief survey regarding interest in having a Hospice House located in Lewis County.

Many of you may be wondering exactly what a hospice house is, and why we are conducting this survey. A hospice house is a place where end-of-life patients can receive the same compassionate and loving care they would be receiving at home while also being made as comfortable as possible by qualified and trained caregivers. A hospice house provides a peaceful, home-like setting for people who are terminally ill. Hospice houses are designed to provide comfort to both patients and their families. Our caregivers at Lewis County Hospice are some of the best and most qualified, and the care they give to those patients whose wish is to die at home is full of thoughtfulness and sensitivity, but there are times when there is no family to fall into the role of caregiver or the family is no longer able to give the care needed to keep their loved one comfortable. A house such as this would the next best thing to being at home. Family members are allowed to visit any time, night or day, and patient comfort is a priority.

The following web sites will provide you with an idea as to how a hospice house functions. The www.houseofjohn.org is a smaller two bedroom version, and the www.jeffersonhospice.org is a larger version that you may already be familiar with. I have had personal experience with the Hospice of Jefferson County and I cannot say enough about the compassionate and loving care that I witnessed, and the comfort and undivided attention received by a patient.

At this time, we are asking for input regarding interest in such a building. There have been many Lewis County residents who have been admitted to the Hospice of Jefferson County when hospice care was not available at home.

Our goal is to give Lewis County residents access to such a house closer to home so that they too can be the recipients of such heartfelt care.
